Although the dolphin is not an official symbol of New Zealand, it may well be so in the minds of New Zealanders, given the nine species that grace NZ's coastal waters. In this variant of the 'Dolphin's Delight' flag design, the hoist-area tableau of a leaping dolphin, silhouetted against a setting sun, occupies one-third of the total length of the flag, and it includes not only New Zealand's official colours of black-and-white but red-white-and blue as well, along with the gold that appears in some other NZ flags. The remaining two-thirds of the flag readily accommodates a black field with a white, New Zealand-style Southern Cross for the national flag, or other field colours and symbols as needed for the remaining flags and ensigns of the nation, as shown above. Perhaps as noble a creature as any human, the dolphin easily deserves its place in this design.
