

New Zealand's longitudinal position just west of the International Date Line ensures that it is often the first major nation to see the light of each new day, and this of course is the origin of the well-known expression, 'New Zealand is first to the light'. Depicting the actual shoreline of a nation on its flag is discouraged, but all rules have exceptions, and a chain of New Zealand shorelines seeming to arrow in the direction of Earth's rotation toward sunrise may well be that exception. The sun is depicted with sixteen rays, and the fly has sixteen distinctive red-and-blue stripes, the number of official regions in New Zealand proper.
