


Radiating outwards from the centre of the hoist, and thus forming an honours-like cross, are four red areas, eight white areas, and four blue areas, their total number signifying the sixteen official regions of NZ proper. The areas to the sinister side of the cross have been extended laterally to the fly edge, forming a distinctive backdrop for the Southern Cross, which is rendered with white stars atop white-haloed black circles for maximum contrast and visibility. Centred on the cross is a black medallion, circled by a white fimbriation and overlaid with a silver fern frond. Because of its tilt, the silver fern frond can be prominently displayed when the flag is purposefully draped, and due to its near-realism, it will never seem like a logo.

The image below shows how 'New Zealand Honour' and its derived ensigns will appear in a lack of wind.






The image to the left shows a special 'banner' version of the flag, its appearance further suggestive of a New Zealand honours award.
